Youth Summer FAQs

Why are summer camps combined next year?

Having a combined camp gives us the opportunity to have all of Watermarks to ourselves and put all our resources into creating an incredible experience where students can encounter Jesus.

Will my middle school student have contact with high school students?

No. Our middle and high school students will be on separate daily schedules.
